<u>Goal 3:</u> Campers will learn relationship and community-living skills. **<u>Outcomes:</u>** Girls will learn to work as a team, have a sense of belonging with others, and learn how to make new friends.

If a Camper is Sick

If a camper has symptoms of communicable illness, including COVID-19, parents/guardians will be immediately notified. Campers experiencing symptoms of communicable illness or exposed to others with symptoms that cannot be attributed to pre-existing allergies or another condition will not be able to remain at camp. If the camp session is canceled due to COVID-19 or a camper is unable to attend camp due to personal illness or exposure, a full refund of the camp session fees will be made.

Communicable Disease Plan & Policies

Camper and staff safety is our number one priority and is at the forefront of every decision we make. We are following local, state, and CDC guidelines as well as GSUSA and American Camp Association (ACA) recommendations.

Our camp communicable disease plan includes the following:

- Hand hygiene
- Cleaning and sanitizing
- Health screening procedures
- Staying home when experiencing symptoms that may indicate communicable diseases

In cases of increased community spread of communicable disease, additional measures may be taken, including:

- Illness screening (before, during and after camp sessions)
- Cohorting
- Physical distancing
- Ventilation (using more outdoor spaces)

Everyone on site (campers, staff, and parents) will be required to follow all policies. Our full summer policies will be provided in the parent handbook and in an email before the start of camp.

Vaccines: Covid-19 vaccines are highly recommended for campers this summer. Regular childhood immunizations are required or a completed and notarized exemption form is required prior to a camper attending camp. More information on the vaccines required can be found on the health form.

Testing: At Camp Togowoods (overnight camp), testing will be required as part of the check-in process.

Masking: At day camp masks may be required indoors or when not able to have physical distance from others. At overnight camp, masks may be required until rapid tests results return and campers are negative for Covid-19.

All health policies are subject to change.

Registering and Paying for Camp

We are continuing to use CampBrain as our camp registration system this year. Returning camp families can log in with their previously created credentials. If you don't remember your password, click the "forgot password" link. New camp caregivers will be required to create a login. If you are unable to register online, please reach out at 907-248-2250 or email **<u>customercare@girlscoutsalaska.org</u>** and we will help you with your registration.

A \$60 non-refundable deposit per program must accompany each registration. For those programs that cost \$75 or less, the non-refundable deposit is \$15/program.

Campers who want to attend a session with a friend (buddy) of a similar age/grade must register for the same camp session as their buddy. Campers must also indicate the buddy they would like to be with on the Camper Information Form. We do not guarantee buddy placement.

Cancellations and Refunds

Full payment is due two weeks prior to the start of the camp. A \$25 change fee will be assessed if a camper changes sessions or dates of attendance. Refunds of fees (excluding the deposit) are given if:

- Cancellation is made two weeks in advance
- Camper has moved out of the council
- Camper has a personal injury/illness confirmed by a physician
- Camper has been exposed to someone with symptoms of or a suspected/confirmed case of communicable disease (refund will include deposit)
- Family emergency

Cancellations must be emailed to **<u>customercare@</u> <u>girlscoutsalaska.org</u>**. Cancellations made less than two weeks before camp are subject to the full cost of camp. If registering within two weeks of the start of camp, full payment is due at the time of registration. Overpayment of less than \$5.00 due to council product credits will not be refunded.



Registering and Paying for Camp

Product Credits

If your girl sold Girl Scout Cookies in the 2022 or 2023 Girl Scout Cookie Program or the 2021 or 2022 Fall Product Program, every item sold gets her one step closer to camp. Each product credit is worth \$0.40 at camp.

Each camp session has a specific number of product credits in order for a camper to attend for free. Campers who sell Girl Scout Cookies or Fall Product but do not have enough for a free session will have their credits applied at \$0.40 per credit. See individual sessions for the amount of Product Credits needed to earn a free session.

The oldest credits will be applied first in order for girls to maximize their use of credits. For multiple camps, Council Product Credits will be applied to a girl's registrations in the order those registrations are received. This summer girls can share their credits and help another girl cover the cost of attending camp.

Credits may be claimed one time only. Credits are only good at Girl Scouts of Alaska camps. Families with product sales or camp delinquencies may be ineligible to use credits or apply for camp scholarships. Tiered Pricing

Tier 1

The actual cost of operating camp, including:

- basic costs of camp including food, staff, supplies, and other operational costs.
 - long-term maintenance, wear and tear to the camp facilities

Tier 2

This partially subsidized cost covers:

- basic costs of camp including food, staff, supplies, and other operational costs
- contributes to covering long-term facility costs

Tier 3

The standard fee that all families are asked to pay. This is the cost that most closely aligns to our traditional pricing structure and covers basic costs of camp including food, staff, supplies and other operational costs.

Tiered Pricing FAQs



If I pay a higher/lower tier, will that affect my child's camp experience?

No. Your choice is confidential, and girls' counselors will never know which tier was selected. All girls will get the same high-quality camp experience regardless of the tier you pay. We don't prioritize waitlists, honor buddy requests, or make any other decisions based on which tier was chosen.

Is there pressure to pay one of the higher tiers?

No. The choice is voluntary, and we will never pressure you to pay at a higher level than you are comfortable.

Do I need to provide income verification if I pay at a lower tier?

No verification is required to pay any of the tiers. We also do not require income verification for the campership application.

How does tiered pricing impact camperships?

Camperships are available to any girl who needs assistance. If you are requesting financial aid you should select the lowest tier (Tier 3) rate.

After I register, is it possible to change the tier selected?

Yes, you can change the tier selected up until the point you pay the balance on your account. Regardless of the tier selected, you must pay a \$60 deposit per program when you register. Full payment is due two weeks before the camp session.

If your circumstances or preferences change before paying the balance, you can change the tier by contacting our Anchorage office. We will not charge a change fee for this change. We do not offer refunds on fees that have already been paid except in the circumstances outlined in our policies.

Camperships (Financial Aid)





Camperships provide assistance to girls who wish to attend camp.

- Any girl may apply
- Families must show there is a need for financial assistance. Need is defined that without assistance your camper would not be able to have a camp experience
- Families with product sales or camp delinquencies may be ineligible to use credits or apply for scholarships. Please contact the council at <u>customercare@girlscoutsalaska.org</u> if you have outstanding balances.
- The girl's family will be expected to pay a minimum payment of \$60.00. If families have difficulty paying the deposit, contact the Anchorage office.
- Campership assistance is awarded up to 90% of the camp fee depending on family size and income.
- TWO sessions of camp per camper may be funded. More than one of your children may apply for a campership. Your camper may apply for a campership even if she has received one in the past.
- You will receive notification of campership granted after we have added it, and your balance will be due in late April/early May.

Welcome to Day Camp!

Girl Scout Day Camp is a wonderful way to experience all the fun of camp and still return home each evening! With guidance from professional leadership and quality staff, day camp is a great place for girls to stretch their limits and widen their horizons. Camper groups are typically made up of 15 campers and two counselors. Girls are grouped by age and will likely have multiple grade levels in each group.



Day camps are held at Camp Singing Hills in Chugiak, which has a lake, forest,

lodge, and trails; and Juneau Day Camp is located at Sandy Beach in Douglas and has a beach, forest, and trails. (Juneau program is partially funded by the citizens of the City and Borough of Juneau through sales tax revenues.) Community day camps are also located in communities throughout Southeast, Southcentral, and Southwest Alaska (pg. 16).

At all camp locations, Girl Scout Day Camp is based on the Girl Scout Leadership Experience:

Discover the leader inside yourself and the world around you;

Connect with others; and

Take Action to make the world a better place.

Each week of camp will focus on the pillars of Girl Scouts (STEM, outdoors, life skills, and entrepreneurship). Every week of camp also incorporates social-emotional/character development as girls challenge themselves, try new things and work together as a team and with their counselors. (Of course, each week girls will have a chance to try all the activities camp has to offer.)

Girls at every camp location will spend the majority of time outdoors to ensure adequate ventilation and physical distancing. Campers will have access to indoor space or cover in the case of inclement weather.

Getting to Day Camp

Bus service will be offered to Singing Hills in summer 2023. Late fees will apply in 2023. Specific information will be provided in the parent handbook and in an email before the start of your camp session.

Discover: Nature

Girls will explore the ecosystems of camp, hike trails, do environmental education activities, and spend time getting to know their Alaska backyard environment with daily nature activities. Art, games, and canoeing (at Camp Singing Hills) will also be part of the camp week.

New This Year: Singing Hills One-Day Camp

This year, week five of camp at Singing Hills will be series of one-day camp sessions focused on one topic. Girls must sign up for each one-day session they want to attend.

Amazing Animals

From tiny ants to huge moose, Alaska is home to a wide variety of animal friends. In this camp, girls could learn how frogs survive the winter, practice what to do when they encounter wildlife, or tell stories from the perspective of their favorite animal. Campers will participated in all the traditional camp activities like art, songs and games, and canoeing, all with an animal twist!

Outdoor Adventurer

Adventure awaits! Outdoor Adventurer campers will explore the natural world of Camp Singing Hills over land and water (in canoes). Learn to build a shelter, help a friend using first aid, or canoe to the far shores of Edmond's Lake. As a group you will choose your day's adventures at camp.

Girl Scout Badge Explorer

Are you ready to explore the outdoors? Earn your Trail Adventure Badge at camp this summer. Girls will plan and go on an adventure while learning about safety, navigation, and teamwork in the outdoors. Campers will also experience traditional camp activities like art, songs and games, and canoeing. Campers will leave with their Trail Adventure Badge in hand.

Discover Hiking

Prepare for your hiking adventure at camp by building outdoor skills like navigation, safety, and teamwork; then take an afternoon trip to a nearby trail such as Eagle River Nature Center, Arctic Valley, Reflections Lake, or Matanuska Lakes State Rec Area. All hikes will focus on exploration and skill-building and the program is open to girls with a variety of hiking abilities. Girls will meet at Camp Singing Hills and be transported to their hike location by 15-passenger van. Hiking counselors will be certified in Wilderness First Aid and trained in safety and emergency procedures.

This summer, all-day camp locations will offer a PA option. Girls must have completed a PA workshop with Girl Scouts of Alaska prior to the first time they attend camp as a PA.

Overnight Camp

At overnight camp, every day is a chance to do something different, meet new people, and challenge yourself. With professional leadership, high-quality staff, and small camper groups with a high counselor-to-camper ratio, overnight camp will feel like a home away from home.

Camper groups are generally made up of 8-12 girls and two counselors. Camper groups attend daily activities together. Special care is taken to ensure that each camper is given challenging opportunities along with basic skill-based instruction. Girl Scouts of Alaska overnight camp is at Camp Togowoods in Wasilla.

the shores of Three Mile Lake near Wasilla. Girl Scouts of Alaska owns the property. It encompasses five ecosystems to explore, including our wetlands boardwalk. All Camp Togowoods campers enjoy arts and crafts, nature hikes, environmental education, swimming, canoeing or kayaking, and outdoor cooking. Campers sleep in platform tents (wooden floors, cots, and mosquito netting), bringing the outdoors within reach. Campers have a sense of independence with the security of counselors living in an adjacent tent. For information on how to fund your camper's camp experience, see pages 6-9.

Traveling to Camp

Girls travel to camp by car and by plane. If your camper is traveling by plane, camp staff will meet her at the airport. Parents are responsible for making travel arrangements. Before making travel arrangements check the parent handbook for specifics on arrival and departure times.

Girl Scout Camp Program

Our Girl Scout Camp program provides a variety of experiences for all campers – new and returning. Some activities will be new, encouraging campers to stretch, and some familiar, reinforcing girls' confidence in their skills. No matter the experience, all our activities will contribute significantly to your camper's growth. During the Girl Scout Camp program, girls experience the core of what camp is all about.

The Girl Scout Camp program gives girls a classic and timeless summer camp experience and includes activities such as art, boating, environmental education, team building and more. Camper groups are arranged by age.

Water Programs

When your camper participates in one of our water programs, she experiences all the fun of our Girl Scout Camp program (page 18) while building paddling skills during daily program blocks at the waterfront. Campers explore our lake and practice their paddling with our Small Craft Safety-trained staff. Togowoods offers canoeing, kayaking, and recreational row boating. As girls gain paddling skills they have the opportunity to participate in progressively challenging adventures.

Wet and Wild campers spend time in or on the water each day as they swim, boat, and play water games.

Paddler's Paradise campers test skills on a half-day kayak trip on Cottonwood Lake and Mud Lake.

River Runners campers experience the ultimate challenge (and thrill) on a halfday river raft trip on Matanuska River with NOVA River Runners. For participant and group safety, NOVA has height and weight requirements for participants. Participants must be between 100 and 265 lbs in weight and between 5ft 2in and 6ft 6in in height.

Wilderness Adventure Programs

Wilderness trips take courage, confidence, and character to the limit. In small groups, girls

quickly learn to count on each other. You have to paddle or hike together or you don't get there. There is no one to do it but you, and you can do it.

Our trip programs teach girls outdoor skills. More importantly, our wilderness trips lay a solid foundation for leadership, teamwork, and self-confidence throughout girls' lives.

All trek programs spend time in remote wilderness areas and at many points on-trail, groups will be more than two hours from professional medical care. Staff are trained in emergency backcountry procedures, carry satellite phones, and at least one staff member is certified in Wilderness First Aid. All programs



require a properly fitted backpack, wilderness-rated packable sleeping bag, and hiking boots. Campers should be able to carry a 20-30-lb. backpack and, for canoeing treks, share the weight of carrying an 80-lb. canoe for up to a mile over land. All wilderness campers also experience the fun of our Girl Scout Camp programs (page 18). Trips are based out of Camp Togowoods.

Lead On

Camp develops courageous and confident leaders. Girls of all ages practice decisionmaking, communication with others, and work on conflict-resolution skills. Our Lead On campers also participate in leadership discovery activities. Throughout a week of hands-on activities, girls will put leadership skills to work. Of course, girls will get to experience everything at camp from hiking to art to boating and more.

Girls who complete Lead On are eligible to retun to camp for a free Lead On: Take Action session, where girls will further develop their leadership skills with hands-on experience as a leader for younger campers. Lead On: Take Action campers will have time each day to debrief together as a group and will sleep in tents with other Lead On: Take Action campers.

Lead On meets the requirements for the Counselor in Training (CIT) program. Girls may attend Lead On multiple summers and earn their Counselor in Training (CIT) II pin.
